Women's rights: Food for thought

In **1971**, a woman:

- Could not serve on a jury (except in Utah). Women were considered the center of the home - their primary responsibility as caregivers. Thought to be too fragile to hear about crime details and unable to be objective because of their sympathetic nature, it wasn't until 1973 that all fifty states allowed them to serve.
- Could not get a credit card in her own name without a husband's signature. A 1974 law changed that.
- Could be fired for getting pregnant until The Pregnancy Discrimination Act of 1978 was passed.
- Could not refuse to have sex with their husband until spousal rape was finally criminalized in all fifty states in **1993**.
- Couldn't pay the same fees as a man for comparable health insurance until **2010**.

Making sense of the new dues structure

The League at all levels is engaged in promoting Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) in its membership, organization structure and practices, and program. As part of that work, many local Leagues are examining and changing their dues practices to remove barriers to membership because of inability to afford the cost of dues.

When someone joins a local League, they also become a member of LWV United States and LWV of Wisconsin. In order for those two organizations to operate, the local pays a PMP (per member payment) to LWV WI and LWV US for each member.

- For a Regular Membership the LWV US receives \$32 and LWV WI receives \$30.
- For a Household Member the LWV US receives \$16 and LWV WI receives \$15.

The state and national Leagues have acted to support local Leagues who offer reduced fee options by reducing or waiving some per member payment fees.

The Door County League has created an "Open Door" Membership for both the primary member and any household members. In this category, the member chooses an amount they are comfortable with as their dues amount.

Saturday, October 30 – Eileen Bohn Speaker Series: Treatment Court Presentation

You may have viewed the Saturday, March 13 presentation on Door County's new Treatment Court. Panelists David L. Weber, Door County Circuit Court Judge, Branch II; Colleen Nordin, Door County District Attorney; Tammy Sternard, Door County Sheriff; and Kelsey Christensen, Court Services and Treatment Court Coordinator. They reported on the nature and purposes of treatment courts, the reasons why one was established in Door County, the three-year process of establishing the treatment

A program on this topic was originally planned as an Eileen Bohn Speaker Series event for April of 2020, which has been rescheduled twice because of the pandemic. We have our fingers crossed that Saturday, October 30 at the Kress Center in Egg Harbor will be the charm. This in-person event will be a larger presentation than the March 13 discussion, including a speaker with statewide experience in Treatment Courts as well as an expanded panel of local officials who are implementing Door County's court.

"If you ever wondered about the importance of observing and sharing meeting information, the March and April County Board meetings highlighted the value of time spent! Our elected officials discussed Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) and how to position the county on the issue.

The April meeting was very different from March, more public input and discussion among board members. The resulting reworked resolution*, supported by most board members, was more reflective of the values of our county.

I recommend that you take the time to observe the April meeting at http://doorbell.net/video/index.htm. Comments by the public and County Board members gave an insight into the diversity of our county. Later in the day, the Board discussed how to approach the issue, which was also enlightening!"

League has a dedicated group of members who observe various committees. Most popular are County Board, Sturgeon Bay City Council, Door County Health & Human Services committee, and school boards. When a member sees an issue that others might want to discuss with representatives, they can contact Barb Graul, Observer Corps Chair. We may share the info in the next newsletter or start an action item if the issue reflects a studied league position. Observing is mostly on line now, but hopefully it will soon be possible to watch faces more closely!

Mental Health/Substance Use (MH/SU) Advocacy Committee

• Consider joining the "advocacy phase" of the League's study group on how the Door County community deals with mental health and substance use issues. (The report and an explanatory

video prepared by the original study committee can be found on the LWV DC website. It will inform you on what was learned by that group.)

- A larger advocacy group is several months into the process of taking action on concerns identified
 in the study. It has set up a structure, including a Steering Committee which meets periodically as
 needed, and three working groups or subcommittees that meet more often to tackle various
 advocacy projects: Community Outreach, Community Education, and Legislative. There is another
 larger group that is monitoring the various committee efforts in order to pitch in on activities as
 needed and as their time allows.
- The two Treatment Court programs mentioned previously are a product of the earlier study committee's efforts to educate the public on topics important to this issue.
