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WHAT IS THE YRBS?

- •The CDC's Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) is a school-based survey used to monitor priority health risk behaviors that contribute to the leading causes of death, disability, and social problems among youth.
- All five Door County school districts participate in the surveys that are conducted every two years.
- The survey is administered to high school and middle school students.
- County, State, and National reports are published.




STATE DATA SUMMARY -ANXIETY

- Over half of all Wisconsin students reported significant problems with anxiety in the past year.
- The numbers are even worse for female students, and for students who identify as lesbian, gay, or bisexual (LGB).



2 of 3 FEMALE STUDENTS reported problems with anxiety.

STATE DATA SUMMARY - DEPRESSION

- Over one-third of all Wisconsin students reported problems with depression in the past year.
- Again, the numbers are even worse for female students, and for students who identify as LGB.



FEMALE STUDENTS were twice as likely to report problems with depression.

STATE DATA SUMMARY - SUICIDE

- Over the past ten years, more and more students report seriously considering suicide – 18.1% this year.
- At the same time, the number of students who say that they can get the help they need when feeling distressed has decreased to only 22.4%.



FEMALE STUDENTS were more than twice as likely to report seriously considering suicide, and twice as likely to actually attempt suicide.

Almost half of LGB STUDENTS reported seriously considering suicide. That is 4 times as high as their peers. LGB students are also 4 times as likely to actually attempt suicide.








DOOR COUNTY SELF-HARM AND SUICIDE






TEENS AND TECH

- A new YouGov poll finds that 88% of Americans believe social media is at least somewhat responsible for the increase of depression among teenagers.
- Large surveys of youth find negative, statistically significant associations between screen use and certain measures of well-being, including depressive symptoms.
 - Adolescents who spend more time on social media and electronics seemed to be at a higher risk for depressive symptoms and suicide-related outcomes.
 - These effects were largely driven by female adolescents.
- The variable of "screen time" is very hard to measure.
