The Door County League is scheduling a session entitled "County Board 101" for members who are observing meetings of the County Board and its committees. However, it is open to anyone interested.



The League Lens

Back in the olden days when print and broadcast media had lots of reporters, we could find out about recent happenings of our elected officials and everyone knew what they were up to. Alas, those days are behind us now. So who's keeping an eye on all those meetings of various school boards, the City Council, village boards, the County Board and all their committees? After all, most of the legislating that touches our daily lives happens there.

The LWV Observer Resource Guide puts it like this: Journalists, civic groups, libraries, schools and others interested in the public's right to know have banded together to help promote this non-partisan effort to enlighten and empower individuals to play an active role in their government at all levels.

The League of Women Voters Observer Corps has been in existence for decades – active and robust here in Door County and many other places until, you guessed it, COVID hit. In 2022, as the pandemic was retreating, Renee Fiedler, Ann Morgan, Dan Powers, Karen Studebaker, Susan Kohout, and other League leaders resurrected it.

"In-person meetings became the exception and virtual and Zoom meetings the norm," explained Rene Fiedler. "Ann Morgan, our treasurer and IT person, assembled all the essential papers and loaded them onto the website, which helped members be free to do the work of observing."

Ann Smejkal joined in late 2022 and together with Renee undertook the enormous task of creating the nuts and bolts of recruiting Observers, getting them trained and prepared to observe municipal meetings.

Here in Door County, we are very lucky to have the *Peninsula Pulse* and *Door County Daily News*, which do a great job of covering Sturgeon Bay's Common Council, area school boards, and the Door County Board of Supervisors and several of their committees.

Debra Fitzgerald, editor of the *Peninsula Pulse*, reached out to the League about creating a partnership in true community journalism, and the concept for "The League Lens" was born.

She put it like this: "Door County is a very large beat for any news organization. To have Observers out there helping us watch the 19 municipalities plus the county of Door is more than helpful – it's vital for democracy."

A partnership like this requires dedication on both sides, and I can say we're well matched and have excellent communication and a great working relationship with ongoing training," Fitzgerald said. "We went live in late 2023 and while we're still in the early stages, each month

the reports have improved. I do believe we are creating a model that can be replicated with partnerships like ours between community journalists and newspapers returning local news to communities that have none – or too little."

What's it like to be a LWV Observer?

Fascinating. Enlightening. Enraging.

How do I become a good Observer?

Say yes. Read the policies. Spend some time with a veteran Observer.

What's my first meeting going to look like?

Introduce yourself to the folks on whatever board or council you're attending. Tell them you're a LWV Observer and have particular interest in items that relate to League priorities and that you are there to observe. Let them know that if there's an item that particularly interests you personally that you'll remove your Observer pin and speak as a concerned citizen.

You'll catch on quickly about how meetings tend to run.

You'll also learn what's important to them – by the time they spend discussing it and how they allocate our taxes.

You'll become acquainted with the officials, staff and other concerned citizens.

It's not at all unusual for Observers to decide to run for office themselves or to be asked to serve on a committee.

When is the next Observer training event?

We're planning a June potluck – a social and training time. Stay tuned for the date.
